

## Winged Ladder Variation of original by Susan Guagliumi

The attached sample was made as follows:

Arrange the needles on the bed, as any multiple of 3. (Sample was 30 stitches).  
Ewrap these stitches and knit 6 rows, ending with COR.



#Set the machine to hold, and pull all needles except the last 3 on carriage side  
On carriage side, skip 3 stitches and ewrap the next 3 stitches.

The needles arrangement should look like this.

The 3 needles in A and in C are in WP, the 3 needles in B are NWP (non-working position), and those to the left of A are in hold.

\*Knit 6 rows, Move the 3 stitches from A to B; move the 3 stitches from C to B; B now has double stitches; now place C needles into NWP;  
Next push three empty needles from A (stitches were moved to B) to NWP; and push the group to the left of those empty needles into work. Your needles should now look like the original arrangement, only with fewer needles in hold.\*

Repeat \* to \* until the double stitches have been placed on the last three stitches.  
Bind off. If you use this as an edging, you stop here. Picture 1.



To make a fabric, place the last bind off stitch on a stitch holder or hand as you move the carriage to the left, place the last bind off stitch on the left needle of the original arrangement. Hang the rest of the stitches on the same number of needles with the wrong side facing you and picking up 3 stitches from each repeat. Be consistent and pick up the edge above the ladders for the knitted portion of each repeat. Thread the yarn, take off hold, and knit one row from left to right.

You are now ready to repeat the pattern from #.

As you add pattern repeats, your fabric will look like Picture2 ( shows three rows).
